## LOCAL SUMMONS OF ROBERT R. SHAW

Honored and Veteran Peace Offi-  
cer Falls a Victim of  
Pneumonia.

### EVIDENCE IN WALKER CASE.

Wife Beater Jailed—D. H. Peery's  
Remains Arrive: Funeral Wednes-  
day—Wife Beater Jailed.

Ogden, Dec. 9.—In the death Satur-  
day afternoon of Deputy Sheriff Rob-  
ert R. Shaw at his home, 1538 Wash-  
ington avenue, of pneumonia, Ogden  
loses one of its most stalwart  
and highly esteemed citizens, a most  
efficient and courageous officer, who  
for almost a quarter of a century has  
been one of the peace officers of the  
city. For a number of years he was  
in the police force of Ogden, and was  
captain of police for several years.  
When C. E. Layne was elected sheriff  
of Weber county Capt. Shaw was nam-  
ed as one of his deputies and has serv-  
ed continuously in that office during  
the past 10 years, first under Sheriff  
Layne, for four years, under Sheriff  
Malley for a like number of years and  
was faithfully performing his duties  
under Sheriff Sebring when the end  
came. Whenever he was sent after  
a man charged with a crime he could  
always be depended upon to get what  
went after. By the criminal ele-  
ment he was feared but respected and  
when the prisoners now confined at the  
county jail were informed of his demise  
gloom was cast over them.

Robert Shaw was born in Illinois 62  
years ago. When a boy of 12 years  
with his parents he came to Ogden  
and has lived here ever since, taking  
an active part in helping to build up  
the city. A young wife, formerly Miss  
Gene Jenkins, a 2-year-old son, sev-  
eral brothers and sisters and a host of  
friends are left to mourn his demise.  
The funeral will be held Tuesday after-  
noon at 2 o'clock at the Third ward  
meetinghouse. The casket will be open  
at the home tomorrow between the  
hours of 10 a. m. and 1 p. m.

### WIFE BEATER JAILED.

Joseph Conneley of Cobro, Nev.,  
Knocks Spouse Down in Street.

Ogden, Dec. 9.—Joseph Conneley of  
Cobro, Nev., was locked up Saturday  
night by Sergeant Fred Tout on a  
charge of assaulting his wife on Twen-  
ty-fifth street, and threatening to shoot  
the officer and a man named Hume,  
who interfered.

Conneley and his wife, formerly Miss  
Essie Hamilton of Ogden, had stopped  
off at Ogden to visit friends while en-  
route to Cobro from Salt Lake. While  
walking with his wife down Twenty-  
fifth street, Conneley became enraged  
at her without cause, being full of  
booze, and struck her a heavy blow in  
the face, knocking her to the sidewalk,  
and then attempted to repeat the pun-  
ishment when Hume interfered, and he  
pulled a gun and threatened Hume's  
life. At this moment Sergeant Tout  
appeared on the scene and soon had  
the shackles on the brutal man and  
landed him in the city jail.
